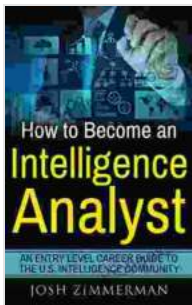

To apply for an entry-level position within the IC, you will need to submit your resume and cover letter to the appropriate agency. You can find job

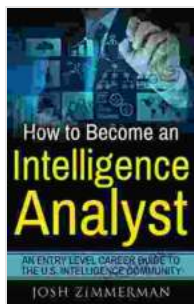
openings on the websites of the individual agencies or on government job boards.

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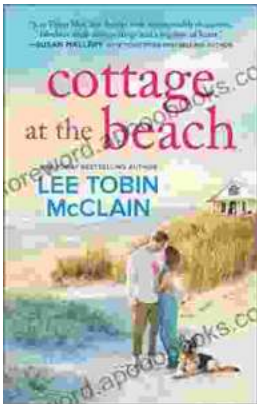
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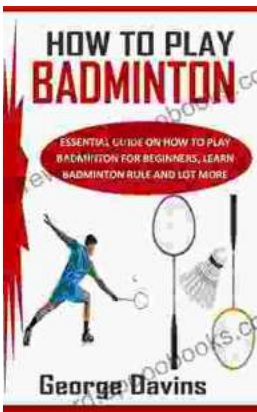
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
